

Local Culture: A Little Taste of Boston and Cambridge

Boston is also known as "bean town" and "the hub." The region is unique for its blending of world class educational, medical, and financial institutions, along with high tech and biotech start-up companies, in an area with many traditional service and "blue collar" workers, to form a strong community. It also has a lot of character.

Presidential Election Already???

You might be asking yourself, "Why are we hearing about Presidential candidates when the next Presidential election is not till November 2020?" Good question!

Let me start with a brief overview of the election system. At least traditionally, the first step is for each Party to pick one candidate: one Republican and one Democratic candidate will be officially chosen at a national Party convention in Summer 2020. Then this pair of candidates will campaign against each other till the November 2020 efection.


President Tump announced his candidacy to be the Republican candidate shortly after his inauguration in 2017. It is possible that other Republicans will campaign against him for the normation. In history, only one elected President (Franklin Pierce) ever lost his bid to be his

elected president. (This happened four times, all in the 19th century.)

So, you might repeat, "Why is this starting now?" Because the battle to get the Party nomination is ferce. The Party organizations in each state will send delegates to the summer 2020 national convention. How those delegates vote is determined, in most cases, by a series of state elections called "primaries" (or, in a few states, "caucuses"). The first of these will be held early in 2020 (yes, about a year from now). Winnig the first few races (lowa and New Hampshire) gives cardicistes a lot of

MBTA

You can "purchase" a Charlie Card, it will be cheaper. (reg. \$2.75 – Charlie \$2.25);

The monthly LinkPass \$84.50

Buses:

Reg. \$2.00 - Charlie \$1.70

Commuter Rail:

Varies from \$2.25-12.50

\$10 Commuter Rail weekend passes (unlimited Sat & Sun travel). Can buy on train.
