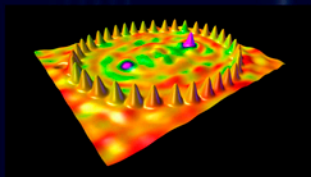


MAKING MOVIES/MAKING SCIENCE: VIDEO SCREENINGS FROM MIT'S DV LAB

EIGHT SHORT FILMS OFFER INNOVATIVE PERSPECTIVES ON SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY-RELATED ISSUES BOTH AT MIT AND BEYOND.



SOME VIDEOS EXPLORE THE EVERYDAY WORLDS OF SCIENCE, INCLUDING A WRY LOOK AT THE REPETITIVENESS OF LAB WORK, PORTRAITS OF SCIENTISTS AT WORK AND PLAY, AND A CONTROVERSY OVER THE NATURE OF VISUAL REPRESENTATION AMONG ELECTRON FORCE MICROSCOPY RESEARCHERS. OTHER VIDEOS EXPLORE ENVIRONMENTAL TOPICS, SUCH AS THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN PEOPLE AND ANIMALS AT AN AGRICULTURAL FAIR. STILL OTHERS CONSIDER "TRADITIONAL" CRAFTS FROM AFRICAN WAX PRINT CLOTHS TO ARMENIAN PUPPETRY AS FORMS OF TECHNOLOGY THAT ARE BOUND UP WITH BOTH IDENTITY AND THE IMAGINATION.

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
