# Ten years of ordination

It was ten years ago this week that I was ordained a deacon, on January 30, 2010. I was ordained a priest a few months later, on May 22. In Acts 6:6, we read about how the people of God in Jerusalem prayed before the ordination of deacons that the HS would guide them to choose upright and pious men worthy to be ministers. The Holy Spirit is behind vocations to the priesthood, but he comes only when the faithful pray that he comes. I'm confident that my vocation to the priesthood in Boston came because many people here in Boston were praying that more vocations come. Acts 13:1-3 also tells us how the seven prophets and teachers in Antioch were fasting and praying in the liturgy when the HS picked Saul and Barnabas to be missionaries to the Gentiles. Which means that those whom God is calling to be priests also need to be among the faithful who are praying for priests.

*My vocation is the result of your prayers and mine*, your asking that the Spirit send more priests, and my asking what it is that God wants me to do. Why he chose me for Boston, when I grew up in Ohio, is a mystery. But I'm happy that he did, and I thank all the people in this archdiocese, and all over the world, for praying that the Spirit send somebody, and that I had the grace to hear a call. Please keep praying! That there be more good Fathers, in the sense of priests, and in paternal sense.

Upon my ordination to the priesthood, people started calling me Father. I became a dad! To a lot of people older than myself, even. Obviously, I'm not called Father because of anything I did—I'm a Father because of the sacrament of Holy Orders, in which Cardinal O'Malley laid his hands on me and configured me to Jesus Christ. That is a great mystery.

It was a little after my ordination that Pope Benedict XVI released *Youcat*, the catechism for youth that was especially intended for that year's World Youth Day. In the preface of *Youcat*, reflecting on the priest abuse scandals, the Holy Father asked his young readers not to be scandalized by the fact that in the very heart of the Church the Evil one has entered. Later, in a discussion of the Our Father, the *Youcat* asks whether those who have no father figures can pray to God our Father. The response is really graphic: even those who have been abused by their fathers can continue to pray to God the Father. The reason is that, although human fathers can through sin be bad images of fatherhood, God is the perfect Father, who loves us as His children, and wants us to be with Him. He is constant, the paradigm of fatherhood; human fathers can only imperfectly approach His perfection, and we shouldn't let sin obscure His glory.

It was frightening, as a new Father, to think that my sins could be magnified by virtue of my ministry, that failures in my personal holiness could lead people away from God. A similar line of thinking led St. John Chrysostom to refuse ordination for many years; he was scared that his salvation would be at risk by accepting responsibility for the souls of others. St. Augustine agreed that being ordained was a risk to the priest's (or bishop's) salvation, but argued that, while being bishop made him at great danger of damnation, being a baptized Christian meant that he was still a son of God, and so could be saved through the mercy God shows His children. Even Fathers are sons... and God loves His sons..

*Please pray for priests. Pray that there be more, and that we be holy.* Pray for all fathers, whether spiritual or natural, that they be close to God the Father, so that they can help their children pray the Our Father with understanding, rather than fear. If we all pray that the Holy Spirit comes, He will, and the whole church—laity, clergy, and religious—will grow as one.

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. And You shall renew the face of the earth.
