

Spring 2012 Election Procedures: UAP/VP Candidates

- 1. The Undergraduate Association Spring 2012 elections will be held from 9 AM Wednesday, March 21, 2011 to 5:00 PM Friday, March 23, 2012.
- 2. The elections will be governed by the Election Code, Campaign Rules Document, as well as these procedures, and supervised by the Election Commission. The commission reserves the right to interpret the Undergraduate Association Election Code and Campaign Rules Document as necessary.

After you pick up a packet you will be added to the e-mail list <ua-candidates> and will receive important electionrelated updates and announcement from the list. To ensure that you are on this list type:

athena% blanche ua-candidates

at an Athena prompt and look for your username. If your name doesn't appear, please contact <ua-elect@mit.edu>.

Up to date election information will also appear on the Election Commission's website at http://mit.edu/ua/elections.

4. CANDIDATE INFORMATION FORM— Due 5 PM Monday, March 12:

All UAP/VP candidates must complete this form and return it to the Election Commission.

5. STATEMENT OF CANDIDACY— Due 5 PM Monday, March 12:

The Election Code mandates that all official candidates file the Statement of Candidacy with the Election Commission in order to be validated. A form for you to sign is included in this packet.

6. PETITIONS—Due 5 PM Monday, March 12:

All UAP/VP must file a petition with the Election Commission to appear on the official ballot. The Election Code mandates that candidates cannot obtain signatures from more than 15% of their constituency. The Election Commission sets the specific number of signature based on Article IV Section 5 of the code.

- a. Candidates for UAP/VP must obtain 430-635 signatures.
- b. All signers of the sheets must be registered undergraduates of MIT. The election commission will check signature sheets for validity.



- c. When circulating the petition you are only allowed to place campaign materials within the printed box on your petition sheets (it cannot be larger than the box). You may not create multiple copies of this box, set up a campaign website, or campaign in any other way before petitions are due.
- 7. PLATFORM STATEMENTS—Due 5 PM Monday, March 12:

Platform statements explain the principles on which you appeal to voters. There is no set formula for a platform; feel free to be creative. All platforms must be sent electronically to <ua-elect@mit.edu>. You may not be included in the Voter's Guide if your platform isn't turned in on time.

8. PHOTOS:

If you have a picture that you would like us to use in the Voter's Guide, please include it with your platform statement in a web friendly format (jpeg, gif). If you do not have a photo or digital camera available, you can get your picture taken in the UA Office when you turn in your paperwork on Monday, March 12.

9. PROOF OF REGISTRATION—Due 5 PM Monday, March 12:

All candidates must be registered students, per the MIT Registrar's Office, in order to eligible to run. Each candidate must obtain a proof of registration from the Student Services Center (11-120), by add date. Winning candidates that fail to do so will be automatically removed from office.

10. FUNDING AND EXPENSES—Due 5 PM Tuesday, April 3:

Campaign Expenses are limited to \$400 (as per Article V, Section 2C of the election code) but you shouldn't have to spend anywhere near that amount to win. Included in this packet is a form on which you should list all your expenses. The form is due in the Election Commission's mailbox (in the UA office) on the Friday following elections. Please note that you will NOT be reimbursed for campaign expenses.

11. DEBATES:

The Tech and the Election Commission will be sponsoring a public debate for UA President and Vice President candidates on Sunday, March 18 at 7PM (subject to change) on the first floor of the student center. Food and drink will be served.

You can also use the ua-discuss list to discuss recent election news and debate with other candidates. However, you may not post campaign material of any kind until you have been cleared to campaign. To add yourself to this list, type "blanche ua-discuss –a <u seria cuseria series" at your friendly local Athena prompt.

12. CAMPAIGNING AND RULES:

Included in this packet is the Campaign Rules Document, which contains a complete listing of election rules. To avoid some of the messier situations that have occurred in the past, it is very important that you read through this document. You may also want to look at the Rules and Procedures FAQ. It contains answers to common questions and further clarifies rules with which there have been issues in the past. The FAQ is available online.

Campaign violations are handled by the Campaign Rules Board, a subsidiary of the Election Commission. Please note that the Campaign Rules Board is not the Violations Police; its job is to act on complaints, not actively seek out violations. If you have a complaint with the way anyone is running his or her campaign, first try to negotiate with the offending individual. If all else fails, send a description of the violation and any evidence you may have to <uaelect@mit.edu>.



UAP/VP Position Descriptions: Spring 2012

UA President:

The President serves as Chief Executive Officer of the UA. He or she is the primary contact person in the UA. The President attends meetings with deans, faculty, local and national media, government leaders, and others on behalf of the MIT student body.

UA Vice President:

The VP is primarily in charge of the internal workings of the UA. The VP is often the person who takes the President's and others' ideas and makes them happen. It's up to the UAP/UAVP to share responsibilities based on the team dynamic.

Spring 2012 Elections Checklist

By Monday, March 12 at 5 PM you must:

- 1. Read all instructions, paying special attention to dates and election procedures.
- 2. Check if your name appears on the ua-candidates list.
- 3. Turn in your candidate information form to the Election Commission.
- 4. Turn in your signed statement of candidacy to the Election Commission.
- 5. Turn in petition signature sheets with 430-644 signatures to the Election Commission.
- 6. Turn in proof of registration.
- 7. Turn in your signed campaign rules acknowledgement statement.
- 8. E-mail your platform and photo to <ua-elect@mit.edu>.
- 9. Have your picture taken for the voter's guide in the UA Office, W20-401.

PLEASE NOTE: Late petitions will only be accepted under the circumstances outlined in Article III, Section C of the Election Code. If you need a deadline extension for obtaining your petition signatures, please let the Commission know the reasons for your request prior to the petition deadline. If your request is approved, you will have until the Late Petition Deadline, Friday, March 16 at 12 PM, to turn in your petition. As you are not allowed to campaign until your petition is approved, turning in a late petition will cut down on your campaigning time.

Summary of the Election Code and Campaign Rules

Registration Requirement

- b. All members of the Class Councils, UA Council, and any other body that the UA oversees with democratic, open elections must be provably registered MIT students. Proof of your registration must be provided to the UA by Add Date of the term the elections are held in.
- c. If proof of registration is not provided by Add Date and you win your election you will be immediately removed from office.

ASA Postering Infractions

A. Do not break the ASA postering rules. You are responsible for any penalties the ASA hands down to your campaign for breaking these rules. The most relevant rules are that you may only place one poster per public board, that posters can be at most 11"x17" in size, and that you may not poster over other current fliers (i.e., fliers that advertise events that haven't happened yet.)

Campaign Rules Document Violations

- a. The full Campaign Rules are available at http://web.mit.edu/elections/current/Election_Code.doc. Violations of these rules will result in a penalty handed down to your campaign from the UA ElectComm. These violations and associated penalties are:
 - a. Level I Violations (those that don't give your campaign an significantly unfair advantage)
 - G. These violations include, but are not limited to: Breaking the ASA postering rules (some of which are noted above.)
 - H. The penalties for a Level I Violation can include an official warning from the UA ElectComm and a possible restriction of your campaigning rights.
 - b. Level II Violations (those that violate the spirit of the elections and present a noticeably unfair advantage to your campaign)
 - G. These violations include, but are not limited to: Campaigning without an approved petition, using large drop posters, sending a campaign email to a list that you are not a member of, or chalking on walls.
 - H. The penalties for a Level II Violation can include revocation of certain campaigning forums (no postering in the Infinite, no campaign emails, etc.), suspension of your campaign, and placing "Violated Election Rules" next to your name on the ballot.
 - c. Level III Violations (those that present a grossly unfair advantage to your campaign)
 - G. These violations include, but are not limited to: Tampering with paper or electronic voting systems, Campaigning in Lobby 10 or in Athena clusters on Election Day, or intentionally sabotaging another candidate's campaign.
 - H. The penalties for a Level III Violation can include placing "Violated Election Rules" next to your name on the ballot, complete revocation of campaigning rights, or removal from the ballot.

Disqualification

- a. Any candidate that commits a severe violation of these elections or the democratic process under which these elections are held may be disqualified if they cannot be sanctioned through the above violations.
- b. Disqualification will be used only as a last resort.
- c. In the event of disqualification, any votes you receive will be the first to be redistributed in the preferential voting system.

Funding Violations

- A. All candidates must submit a funding form whether they spent any money or not. Candidates that fail to do so and win will be removed from office and replaced by their runner-up.
- B. Any complaints regarding campaign finance will be directed to the Campaign Rules Board subcommittee of ElectComm. They will hand down any sanctions stemming from a complaint.
- C. If you go over the funding limit for your campaign you will be fined the amount you went over the limit. UA JudBoard and the Campaign Rules Board will then hand down additional sanctions if necessary.
